Background:

How do you serve in GCI? I currently serve GCI as the Superintendent for Asia. My work involves overseeing churches, brethren, and affiliates in the Philippines and Northeast Asia, including Japan and China. I serve with a team of two regional directors, serving Southeast Asia, Singapore, India, the Indian Subcontinent, and some members in UAE in the Middle East. In addition to administration, my ministry also involves equipping, pastoral care, network building, and resource mobilization. It is a blessing to participate in this ministry together with Regional Director Wong Mein Kong for Southeast Asia, and Regional Director Danny Zachariah for India and the subcontinent. They are capable, wonderful people and they serve as part of my Community of Practice for Asia. */ How did you connect with GCI*? My sophomore year in college was a milestone in my growth as a Christian. Still fresh in my mind are memories of late afternoon small group Bible studies under the shade of trees on campus through my friends at State Varsity Christian Fellowship. It was on one of those afternoons when I accepted Jesus Christ as my Savior. It was also in college when I got hold of the Plain Truth magazine owned by a classmate. He was the one who first invited me to worship with him in one of the bigger Worldwide Church of God services in Manila. The rest is history! */ How has your ministry developed*? This year I am celebrating my 42nd year of being in WCG and now GCI, since being baptized in May 1977. That was the start of my journey and it has been quite a ride! In 1990, I was ordained and became an assistant pastor. In 1993, I also assumed the role of business manager for our national office. In 1998, I started serving as an area superintendent, until my appointment as National Director for the Philippines in 2002. In 2004, I was

blessed to help start Ambassador School for Children, a kindergarten and elementary school which up to now is making a modest contribution to Christian education in our community. In 2007, I was given an added responsibility as Mission Developer for the region that included China, Japan, and the United Arab Emirates. In 2018, I was given the privilege of serving as Superintendent for all of Asia. Praise God for His faithfulness and for using me as an instrument in this corner of GCI! This work and this part of the Body is definitely worth investing life in. / *Who invested in you for your ministry?* My family, first and foremost.
