What is the kingdom?

- Leaven (Matthew 13:33): The kingdom works subtly yet powerfully, permeating and transforming everything it touches.
- Treasure Hidden in a Field (Matthew 13:44):
 The kingdom is of immense value, worth sacrificing everything to obtain.



- A Farmer Sowing Seed (Matthew 13:3-9, 18-23): The kingdom's growth depends on the receptiveness of the human heart, likened to different types of soil.
- A Pearl of Great Price (Matthew 13:45-46): The kingdom is a treasure of unparalleled worth, compelling believers to prioritize it above all else.
- The Wedding Banquet (Matthew 22:1-14):
 The kingdom is a celebration open to all, yet it calls for a response and readiness for those invited to experience it.

These metaphors emphasize the kingdom's dynamic, inclusive, and transformative nature.
