Tell us about your role.

I am the lead pastor at GC Lemon Grove, where I serve alongside my husband, who is the preaching pastor. We have served this congregation since 2001 when we moved to the San Diego area.

What makes you a good fit?

At my core I am a lover of God and of people, which fuels me to use my gifts, talents, and training to serve my congregation and our community. My personality lends to communication, leadership, visioneering, administration, connecting, evangelizing, mentoring, and caring for people. I resisted ordination for a while, because
I think I wanted to prove that you don't
have to be ordained to minister.
However, God clearly showed me
I needed to trust him and say yes to being
ordained out of obedience. At my
ordination, so many of the male leaders in
GCI who I admired and had learned from,
got up and shared how they had
experienced my ministry over the years.

Although some of the exact words have faded from my memory, I will never forget the experience of God confirming my path forward.



What else is important for our readers to know?

For 19 years I was involved in directing a regional GCI youth camp. I was so passionate about young people; I poured half of each calendar year into planning a one-week camp experience.

With our neighborhood-based day camp structure, now I am free to pour all my time into the community that I live in. I see my little city of Lemon Grove as our parish where we get to care for and bless the people in this geographical area.
