# **Why Place-Sharing Matters**

In his work on youth ministry, theologian Andrew Root introduces the concept of place-sharing — a relational practice where we enter into the experience of another, offering our presence in solidarity, not as saviors or fixers. Place-sharing reflects the way Jesus shares our place, becoming human, walking with us, and revealing the Father through relationship.

When we engage in place-sharing, we embody a relational, incarnational way of witnessing. We create space for belonging, mutuality, and transformation. Place-sharing isn't about doing something for someone — it's about being with someone in love, humility, and care.

# THE HACK: A MONTH OF PRACTICING PLACE-SHARING

Invite your Love Avenue team to build a place-sharing rhythm for one month:



### 1. Choose a Context for Connection

Pick one consistent, relational space in your neighborhood — a café, community garden, library, class, or local event. Make it your team's "anchor place" for the month.

# 2. Be Present and Pay Attention



Show up without an agenda. Listen. Learn names. Ask questions. Let conversations unfold naturally. Don't rush it. You're not there to fix; you're there to **share place**.



### 3. Practice Mutuality

Place-sharing is not one-sided. Share your life, too. Allow others to care for you. Be vulnerable when appropriate. Let real relationship develop.









### 4. Reflect as a Team

Each week, gather and ask:





- What surprised me about this experience?
- Who am I being invited to journey with?
- What might sustained presence look like in this place?



### **HOW PLACE-SHARING SUPPORTS ALL THREE AVENUES**



**Love Avenue (Witness):** Place-sharing deepens our witness by building genuine, consistent relationships in our neighborhood. Instead of inviting people to a program, we are inviting them into our lives. We become neighbors in the truest sense — present, known, and engaged.



**Hope Avenue (Worship):** Place-sharing enriches our corporate worship by giving us a deeper sense of who we're worshiping with and for. When we know the people in our community, we pray differently, we teach differently, and we shape our gatherings with empathy and welcome.



**Faith Avenue (Discipleship)**: Discipleship is about transformation in the context of relationship. Place-sharing is the soil in which discipleship can grow — offering a model of presence, vulnerability, and shared spiritual journey. It helps faith groups move beyond content to connection.
