Faithful management of everything God has entrusted to us — our time, energy, gifts, relationships, finances, and creation — as a response to his abundant grace.



Stewardship Is a Response to God's Generosity

God is the source of every good thing. Our lives, relationships, resources, talents, and opportunities are all gifts from him. Stewardship isn't about obligation or guilt. It's about gratitude.

In gratitude, we responsibly and faithfully care for ourselves, our loved ones, and what we have been given so that we may freely and generously care for, serve, and support others.

When we understand how generous God has been toward us, our natural response is to offer ourselves back in love. Stewardship is our "thank you" to God, expressed in how we live, serve, give, and care for ourselves and others.

As Paul wrote: "in view of God's mercy, ... offer your bodies as a living sacrifice" (Romans 12:1 NIV). Our whole life becomes an offering.



The Biblical Call to Stewardship

From Genesis to Revelation, the Bible paints a picture of stewardship rooted in relationship with God. Humanity was created in God's image and entrusted with the care of creation (Genesis 1:28). This original calling continues through every generation.

Jesus teaches us that we are stewards, not owners (Luke 12:42–48). Everything we have is a trust. We're called to be faithful and wise in how we use it. Stewardship is about living with open hands and an open heart, knowing that "where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matthew 6:21 ESV).

Stewardship is never about earning God's favor. It's about living in alignment with his character, being generous, compassionate, and attentive to others.



Whole-Life Stewardship

Stewardship involves every part of life, not just tithing or financial giving. God invites us to use all that we are and have for his glory and the good of others:

- **Time:** Being present with others, serving intentionally, and using each day meaningfully.
- Talents: Using our spiritual gifts and personal skills to bless others and build up the church.
- Relationships: Investing in love, listening, reconciliation, and encouragement.
- Resources: Practicing generosity with finances, hospitality, and possessions.
- Creation: Caring for the environment as stewards of God's world.

Everything belongs to God, and he invites us to participate with him as caretakers and co-workers in his mission.

Why Stewardship Matters to the Church
